

## Curzon Sports Premium expenditure Sept 2016-July 2017.

The government provides funding nationally to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport that primary schools offer, for the benefit of primary-aged pupils. Money received by Curzon for the academic year was £8,665.

The rationale for spending this funding was to;

- develop or add to the PE and sport activities that the school already offers
- make improvements that will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- ensure the profile of PE and sport is high within the school

Curzon's specific sports objective for the year 2016-17 was to 'train up a new sports leader who will be able to implement the sport funding criteria to effectively impact the pupils with regards to their approach to sport and lifestyle'. This has been achieved under criteria 1, 2 and 3 below.

Sports Funding Criteria	Cost	Impact
1. Provide existing staff with training and resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively	£740  £356	Swimming training for two members of staff enabled 73% of upper KS2 and 51% lower KS2 to attain the KS2 curriculum standard for swimming. Also 81% upper KS2 and 71% attained safe self-rescue skills. Other cpd included; 2 members of staff trained in <b>outdoor games</b> to encourage pupil physical fitness. New games were successfully introduced into playground to reduce any potential behaviour incidents. <b>Developing Sports Leaders</b> course (strategy utilised in PE lessons, and in events like sports day, weekly Wake Up Shake Up sessions), also develops longer term sports skills which can be utilised by pupils in future years. <b>Physically literate to physically educated</b> (Physical literacy described as the motivation, confidence, physical competence, knowledge and understanding that provides children with the movement foundation for lifelong participation in physical activity.) End of term PE awards identified pupils who are becoming physically literate; competent, confident and healthy movers. <b>County PE Conference</b> increased Sports Teacher's confidence, knowledge and skills in the teaching of PE and sport.
2. Introduce new sports or activities and encourage more pupils to take up sport, to foster future healthy lifestyles	£1500  £300	Examples of new sports and activities introduced this year to match pupil interests have been Handball and Dodgeball. These were then utilised in a competitive sports festival. Year 3 pupils enjoyed a wider range of sport than they experienced in KS1 eg hockey, tennis, tag rugby, athletics. Pupils of all abilities are motivated to engage in physical activity and do their very best, embracing opportunities to exercise for health benefits. Several pupils joined local sports clubs in football, athletics, tag rugby. Purchase of a variety of resources to enable pupils in both Key Stages to enjoy healthy lifestyles eg Action Kids music and teaching resource for KS1, goal nets for playtimes on the field, spare PE kits so no child missed a PE lesson.

Support and involve the least active children by running or extending school sports clubs also encouraging more pupils to take up sport</p>	<p>£450  £450</p>	<p>Sports Clubs provided by the school this year were; football, netball, multi-sports, Taekwondo, gym, athletics and ActiveGamerz. 65% pupils attended a sports club. Evidence of good participation by less active pupils, enjoyment and improvement of skills.  The Cross Country Club also had a knock on effect in encouraging various Dads to support the children, thereby providing increased numbers of role models to inspire the children. The club injected an enthusiasm to improve pupils' levels of fitness.</p>

Sports festival entries included multi-skills, swimming gala, Capture the Flag, rugby, and a variety of Y6 competitions. These events for Curzon pupils to meet and play against pupils from other schools promoted inclusive practice and through competition, developed skills and increased self-esteem eg Year 5 and 6 pupils beat personal best records in Cross Country.
