

Welcome to Class 6 - September 2021

Dear Parents/Carers,

Welcome to Year 6! A warm welcome back from our summer holidays to you and your child. Year 6 is a very busy and exciting year as we give the children increased responsibility and, dare I say it, prepare the children for their move to secondary school next September. We hope for a more normal year this year, where children are able to return to whole school activities such as collective worship together but the health and safety of all children remains our priority.

Literacy:

We will be focusing on a variety of texts this term and will be looking at fiction, non-fiction and poetry. Our aim is for the children to be able to identify and write in a number of genres. All children will be expected to be able to identify parts of a sentence e.g. adverbial clauses etc and will be encouraged to use this knowledge to improve their writing skills and work on using a range of vocabulary to fit the purpose of the writing. Key texts include Kensuke's Kingdom and A Christmas Carol.

The majority of our lessons will focus on sentence level improvements, with children planning, drafting, writing and editing to evaluate the effectiveness of their writing. We will in addition have grammar, spelling, vocabulary development and reading and comprehension sessions. We will have a particular grammatical feature/punctuation focuses week and some homework tasks will focus on these too.

Literacy targets for the term will be set based on an initial assessment of your children's next steps in writing. Please talk to your child about their targets and encourage them to work hard towards them. We strongly believe in encouraging children to take ownership of their learning, which includes developing both a love of learning for its own sake and a responsible, hard-working attitude.

Maths:

This term, we will be looking at place value (numbers to 10 million and negative numbers) and using all four operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. This will include mental methods and written methods. Also, we will be working on fractions and geometry, position and direction. **We will be doing weekly tables tests so please ensure all tables are practised regularly.**

Spelling and Grammar

We will continue to remind all pupils about their 'non-negotiables' which will include correct copying from the board, neat presentation plus checking they have used capital letter for names and punctuation at the end of every sentence. Please support us by asking your child to read though his/her homework to check for spelling and punctuation errors before they hand their work in.

Homework:

New homework will **be given out on a Tuesday and is due in the following Monday.** It is important that homework is given in on time to ensure a smooth transition between the pieces.

Literacy homework will be a mixture of grammar/spelling questions and Literacy tasks, some of which will require children to work independently and creatively. Maths homework will be a mixture online activities, arithmetic and problem solving activities. Some homework will be set online and some will be set to do in their homework books. This will be explained and modelled to the children each Tuesday when the homework will be given out. If children have a problem understanding the homework then they are expected to ask for help before the due date.

Reading will be checked in the reading diary each day and the expectation is to read at least 3 times a week. Children will be rewarded “Dojo House points” for reading but if there is not signed evidence of reading the agreed 3 times a week then children may be asked to “catch up” with their reading during some of their Friday break time as we believe that reading regularly is the key to academic progress and achievement.

Ways to Support Your Child at Home:

- Understand that some homework assignments may involve your child teaching you a concept they have learned in class. **Learn together how to get the result required.** In terms of Maths, our updated calculation policy is available on our website, so please refer to it if in doubt of any methods we are teaching in order to minimise confusing by teaching them another method. If your child is confused by the homework, please encourage them to come to me before the due date and I will help them.
- **Emphasize the importance of homework and hard work as a route to success** rather than relying on any innate talent or simply giving up or not giving their best. Ideally, help your child to establish a regular time and place (away from the TV and technology) to complete their homework.
- Please don't think that they don't need your input any more with their reading. Reading is key to the development of your child's learning process as it underpins the whole curriculum. Do make sure that they are reading suitable texts regularly, interspersing fiction with nonfiction and different genres, including newspapers. Children are expected to read with an adult a minimum of three times a week and to make notes on their progress in their Reading Record. **At this age, it is still good for them to read aloud to you, and sometimes hear you read to them so that they can copy your intonation.** Do question them on their thoughts about the setting, characters, plot, author's choices, inference etc as they will be tested on this in their KS2 SATs.
- Vocabulary development happens quickest during the moment: unknown word meanings should be systematically sought out when they come across them (e.g. reading a newspaper), with those words that could be used in class writing being written somewhere to aid retention.
- **Think carefully about how much screen time your child is getting, late nights and gaming often negatively affects their focus in class** and issues that have happened online follow them into their lives at school. This can impact their mental health as well as learning. Whilst I am always happy to discuss these, it would be greatly appreciated if their use of mobile and technology was **closely monitored** at home by you. A set of clear rules agreed by both you and your child is a great start. We have updated our Acceptable Use policy in school to link better with our new values and with home and this will be signed by your child.

Your Child's Responsibilities:

Year 6 children are expected to take increasing responsibility for their own work and organisation. This includes accurately writing down homework in their homework planner; handing in homework on time; having the appropriate resources such as classroom stationery, PE kit (Tuesday and Wednesday). Please help your child to develop good habits now by helping them set up a good system for this, which works for them. Well done to those children who found time to read regularly and practise their times tables over the summer.



There will be a **3 strikes** and then a **Yellow Card** rule for **PE kit** and for **homework**, which will start fresh each term.

Achievements:

Parents can record extra-curricular achievements outside the classroom in their child's homework book. This might include passing a music exam, attaining a well-earned badge in Scouts or Guides or playing particularly well in sport at the weekend. It will enable me to gain a holistic picture of your son/daughter's progress and particular talents. It will also enable us as a school to recognise and celebrate achievement outside of the classroom.
